AFTER THE TSUNAMI:

Relief Work In Sri Lanka

On December 26 we witnessed a human disaster of biblical proportions. Watching this tragedy unfold on our televisions and thinking - there but for the grace of God - we all felt the need to reach out and help, to ease the suffering of people who were struggling with so much pain and loss. And we did just that. Members of healthy, thriving, communities in the United States, sharing our talents and resources with members of devastated communities in Sri Lanka who needed immediate assistance to recover from the Tsunami in order to help themselves.

We organized a benefit at the Englewood Field Club – a place we treasure as a safe haven for our children – to raise funds to help the victims of the Tsunami in Sri Lanka. A week before the benefit, the organizers of the traditional Scottish Haggis celebration at Rafaella's, in the Village, donated all the proceeds from this event to the Tsunami relief fund of United Aid. The residents of Englewood Cliffs organized a benefit for the victims of the Tsunami at the Assembly Restaurant and chose United Aid to distribute proceeds from their event to the victims in Sri Lanka. The United Aid Benefit at the Englewood Field club on February 3, 2005 was the result of the unstinted generosity of friends and neighbors in New Jersey, New York and Connecticut. **It was an extraordinary tribute to the power of the human spirit.**

Thanks to the law firm of Piper Rudnick, we received our 501c3 charitable status; enabling us to receive tax deductible donations totaling approximately \$48,000.00. for our relief mission. Members of the foundation who represent professionals in fields of law, medicine, industry, the arts and finance - some of whom have grown up in Sri Lanka and maintain close ties with the communities they grew up in - worked with established non governmental and governmental organizations in Sri Lanka to provide direct aid to the neediest: the poor and the displaced who were victims of the Tsunami.

We focused our efforts on first providing immediate survival needs to the refugees through the Poorna Health Trust in Sri Lanka, whose trustees were maintaining four camps in the North East. Based upon findings during our March relief mission, we chose specific programs we felt deserved our continued support and sponsorship. These programs included providing: a) shelter to children; many who were orphaned by the Tsunami and the civil war b) medical care for the refugees c) replacement of livelihood tools and materials and c) material to rebuild schools damaged by the Tsunami. Our priority was providing direct aid - bypassing political agendas, ethnic prejudices and administrative road blocks to reach those who need it most.

Immediate Response to the Tsunami

Ravi Jayewardene accompanied by **Mr John Alex (United Aid Foundation)** departed for the East Coast on the 5th January 2005. This initial visit was the start of working on the East Coast in the four camps mentioned later in this report. It was decided to work on the East Coast, as this was where the tsunami struck hardest. It was also selected because of its remote location and inaccessibility, as bridges and causeways had been destroyed.



None of this work would have been possible, if not for the Special Task Force of the Sri Lanka Police, who are in charge of this area. They have to be commended for the humanitarian work they performed in saving lives and finding shelter for many people at great risk to their own lives, from the moment the tsunami struck. Coordinating work through them was a pleasure.

PHASE TWO

Visit on 12th and 13th February 2005

Participants: Dr Ranji Vamadevan, Dr Dhana Saravanapavanathan, Dr Amitha Kanagaratnam, Dr Nirmala Nadarasah, Dr Umesh Perera, Sister Sriyani, Sister Hapuarachchi, Ravi Jayewardene, Penny Jayewardene, Pat Dharmapala, Beta Mendis, Aloma Perera, Manori Dissanayake.

United Aid Foundation funded urgently required items for the four identified camps which were dispatched in the first week of February. These items were: lighting, mosquito nets, slippers and material for waterproofing tents, water tanks and water pumps.

After Poorna Trust received a request for Medical Camps from the Special Task Force, their Team set out on its first field visit. They found that people had received medical help but not ongoing care. They had five doctors and two sisters on our team, who all spoke Tamil. The people in the camps welcomed their care and were happy to hear they would be seeing them again. They treated close to 250 patients in the four camps and three persons had to be hospitalized. They found that people were well fed, but lacked varied nutrition. They noticed sores, scabies and skin conditions associated with lack of

vitamins, greens and fruit in the diet. They took steps to fulfill these needs, as best they could on subsequent visits.

The needs identified for future visits were: nutrition for mothers and babies, separate bathing facilities for women and children, 3 megaphones, a tractor/trailer with a 2000Lt water bowser, a tractor/trailer for emergency lighting and well cleaning facilities, 4 baby baths and 2 television sets.

United Aid Foundation helped to fund these supplies

- An earlier visit by Dr. G.A.P. Ganepola also from **United Aid Foundation**, endorsed the idea Mrs. Ravi Jayewardene had of conducting a medical camp for pregnant mothers. Dr, Ganepola handed over to PHCT 100 packs of vitamins for pregnant mothers on his visit in mid February, 2005. These items were distributed at medical camps conducted during our visits.

- On the 28th of March an Obstetric and Gynecological clinic was conducted by Dr. Anandi Kumarasamy. Thirty five pregnant mothers were seen and five new pregnancies were detected. The ladies with a risk factor were advised and sent with a covering letter to the Base Hospital for further care. All mothers were given nutrition packs and vitamins.

Visit on 25th to 27th February 2005

Participants: Ravi Jayewardene, Penny Jayewardene, Gamini Amaratunge, Ravi Shanker Kumaraswamy, Arjantha Subramaniam & Sheena Samudeen.

The main reason for this visit was to take delivery from the manufacturers Edna Appliances (Private) Limited of a tractor trailer and a tractor bowser. The specifications are as follows. The 5 HP tractor is fitted to a trailer, with a 3 inch SP water pump, a 3 KVA alternator and a 10 feet 3 inch green hose. **This piece of equipment was solely funded by United Aid Foundation - USA.**

This tractor trailer will also be used at the camps for emergency lighting. It will also be of great use when the present camp dwellers are relocated to permanent shelter. The most significant use for this piece of equipment is that it is presently used to provide emergency lighting at distant locations in the camps and in the future it will be of great service in cleaning and purifying drinking water wells when camp dwellers are relocated.



NUTRITIONAL NEEDS FOR MOTHERS AND YOUNG CHILDREN

While members of Poorna Trust conducted their survey on future needs for the refugee community it became obvious to us that there were nutritional needs for mothers and children, which were not being met. A list of items of nutritional supplement was compiled and this project was successfully completed on the next visit to the camps (27th March to 01st April 2005).

PHASE THREE

Visit from 27th March to 1st April 2005

Sheena Samsudeen.**

United Aid Foundation funded a large amount of the work undertaken by the Poorna Health Care Trust. Mr. John Alex , Treasurer of United Aid Foundation accompanied Mr. Ravi Jayewardene on the initial visit to the East Coast in early January 2005. Witnessing the devastation of this region, PHCT with backing from Mr. John Alex and Mrs. Sandra Nunez started purchases required for these camps.

Sandra Joseph Nunez conducted an activity center with Tangram puzzles donated by the Dwight Englewood Lower School for the younger children in the camps and a jewelry making activity center for the older children. **Alexander Nunez** set up baseball, badminton, cricket and soccer activity groups with equipment donated by the **Modell family. Dr. Domingo Nunez** assisted the visiting doctors set up their clinics in the camps. **Sandra Nunez, Savitri Weerackody and Sylvia Virgona** distributed toys, clothes and school supplies to refugee children. These items were donated by members of the **Bergen County community.**

SCHOOLS & ORPHANAGE RELIEF & SUPPORT

- Sandra Nunez visited the Bhaktivedanta Orphanage with Penny Jayawardene. United Aid is sponsoring five children orphaned by the Tsunami at \$420 per child per year. The orphanage focuses on educating the children and nurturing their cultural traditions through dance and music. The orphanage is built on land donated by Rani Anandasabapathy, a member of the UAF board whose mother is a trustee of the orphanage in Sri Lanka. When Sandra returned to the United States she arranged for the sponsorship of five more children for two years funded by the Dwight Englewood School. **Our goal is to sponsor ten more children this year. - UAF funded the rebuilding of a library at Yasodhara Devi Balika Niwasa orphanage on the recommendation of Savitri Weerackody and Leonard Wickramasinge, with a further donation of \$2,200.00 to complete the project.
- A shipment of six cartons of donated clothes and medical supplies collected in a drive organized by Savitri and Sylvia. The shipment was funded by United Aid Foundation through Colombo Express & Butari Exports at a cost of \$1,725.00. - After the General medical camp on the 29th March, 2005, United Aid Foundation and Poorna Health Care Trust visited Thirukovil Hospital. Dr. Domingo Nunez consulted with the Doctor in charge regarding needs for the hospital .

- Poorna Health Care Trust has subsequently contacted Dr. Jeganathan, Consultant, North East Health Care Development, Ministry of Health. Dr. Jeganathan intimated that funding for rebuilding the kitchen, nurses quarters and men's' and women's' wards at the hospital had been received. Poorna Health Care Trust is in contact with Dr. Jaganathan and will advise United Aid Foundation of how the project is developing. He has since advised us that a fully funded project to totally upgrade Thirukovil Hospital is in the Government pipeline. PHCT has therefore decided not to duplicate work and identified and secured alternative projects to be funded.

“Sandra Joseph Nunez, Savitri Weerackody and John Alex visited the camps with our trustees and doctors, financially supported our work and enabled us to undertake projects way beyond are financial scope. In no small measure has this contribution made a difference in the lives of the four thousand one hundred persons in these camps (1100 families).

The trips to the East Coast take 9 to 11 hours each way. We generally travel up in a van which is air-conditioned. However, the seats are basic and not built for comfort. The President and members of United Aid Foundation who made the trip with us will never forget the physical hardship they endured. However, the work at our destination is so needy that we make the trip as often as we have to despite hardships.”

The camps now are equipped and people housed in the camps are learning to use facilities that will be available to them after they are relocated to permanent lodgings.

Permanent shelter is slow in being provided due to lack of proper infrastructure to deal with land allocation for house construction. This situation has still not improved.

Poorna Health Care Trust is in touch with the camp co-coordinators and will keep interested donors advised of future needs.”

Work Undertaken in June 2005

In June 2005 **United Aid Foundation** funded three projects, which were implemented through **Rebuild Sri Lanka**. Poorna Health Care Trust, acted as facilitators for United Aid Foundation USA, who funded the three projects at a total cost of US\$3400/- .

Rebuild Sri Lanka volunteers travel extensively throughout the affected areas each week, identifying livelihood projects and requirements. Networking with the military, STF and local authorities, written requests are received each week pertaining to livelihoods and related requirements. Items and materials are identified and when funding is available are provided.

4. TORP PROJECT WITH SLMANA : \$5,000.00

United Aid will support the Tsunami Orphans Rehab Project with SLMANA to link 30 children orphaned by the Tsunami to the care of The Salesian

missionaries in Murunken, Mannar district. The project will include the construction of two dormitory styled buildings for the children, repairs to the existing kitchen, food and clothing, augmentation of teaching staff and construction of a facility for voluntary visiting medical personnel.
